Member's Notes.....



Allen Boyd Rasmussen, 74, died at his home in Lehi, Utah early Tuesday morning.

Born June 5, 1938 at Mount Pleasant, Utah to John Boyd and Vera Nielsen Rasmussen, he married Lara Lynne England February 18, 1966 in the Salt Lake LDS Temple.

Educated primarily in Utah Schools, he graduated from South High School in Salt Lake, attended BYU, graduated from the University of Utah with a Bachelors of Science in Education, and later graduated from Utah State University with a Masters in Education Administration.

Served in the US Army from 1956-1959 in Army Finance. Fulfilled an LDS mission to Argentina. He was a faithful member of the LDS Church serving as a bishop's counselor, high councilman, bishop, teacher, and other assignments. Served a second mission at the Salt Lake Family History Center with his wife.

Mr. Rasmussen taught school for thirty years in the Granite School District at Whittier, Farnsworth, and

Orchard Elementary Schools, where he taught grades 2 thru 6. He enjoyed watching the growth and progress his students made. His highlight was producing musical productions and choruses with students.

During most of his teaching career he was actively involved in his teachers' association, serving at GEA, UEA, and NEA levels. He believed in leaving the profession better than he found it. He worked for increased funding for student supplies and text books.

Allen is survived by his wife, Lara, Sons Mark Allen (Aunalia), John Matthew (Ginger), Benjamin C, and David Earl (Laurisa), Siblings Robert E' Rasmussen, Kay Elaine Coscia, and John Keith Rasmussen, Step-father Bob Cox (Betty Lou), and 11 grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his son Daniel Lee Rasmussen.

John Henry Sparger was born Oct. 4, 1841, the oldest of the 5 sons of Bethania and Murlin Sparger. He volunteered early in the Civil War in Company I, 21st NC Volunteer infantry. He was wounded at Winchester, VA in May 1862 and later in the war at a battle below Richmond. In May of 1863 while en route to a Confederate field hospital at Gordonsville, VA, his shoulder was severely dislocated in a railroad accident. He received a medical discharge in March of 1865. He returned to Surry County and resumed his life-long occupation of farming. In 1870 he married Mary Matilda Ann Smith. Together they had at least six children, four of whom survived when Mr. Sparger died at his home in Mount Airy July 21, 1925. He carried his Civil War injuries with him for sixty years following the end of the war. He was buried at the cemetery of the Salem Methodist Church in Mount Airy, NC.

From Collections and Recollections: A Tribute to our ancestry on this our 100th Anniversary - Mount Airy, NC 1885 - 1985 published and c. 1985 by The Mount Airy Restoration Foundation, Inc.

In July of 1913, Mr. Alf Dean, a Mount Airy storekeeper and veteran of the 29th Virginia Regiment during the Civil War, along with fellow veteran John Sparger, planned a trip to the scene of the Battle of Gettysburg with other veterans of the War from across the US.

"Some months before their departure, thirty-seven gallons of apple brandy had been discovered in the cellar of Mr. Nations, who had died. Since it was prohibition time, the town had taken possession of the spirits. The brandy could not be legally poured out, sold, drunk or given away because it was part of an estate, so for about a year the problem of what to do with the brandy had consumed not only local thought, but had been a topic of discussion in area newspapers. S. G. Pace, a local official, had taken possession of the brandy while awaiting an order from a superior court judge as to its disposal. Meanwhile, Mr. Sparger and Mr. Dean approached Mr. Pace with a request that they be supplied with a vial full of the now famous brandy to take along on their trip to the veterans reunion at Gettysburg. The reason given was that they would be traveling through snake territory and needed the brandy for protection in case of snake bite. Mr.

Pace was not moved by their request and the two old veterans had to take their chances on the snakes without the safeguard of the fifteen-year-old brandy."

EDMOND — **Marilyn Johnson Leonard**, 79, went to walk with her Lord on May 30, 2012, after an extended illness. Marilyn was born in Edmond, Okla. on February 8, 1933, to "J. Sam" and Alice (Weaver) Johnson. She married Glenn W. Leonard on July 2, 1954 in Edmond, and will be missed greatly as a wife of 58 years, as a loving mother and grandmother. Marilyn attended Central State College (UCO) as a member of Pi Kappa Sigma Sorority and was a member of many social and business organizations, notably a lifelong member of the American Legion Auxillary and a longtime member of the Edmond Historical Society. She and Glenn started and operated "Import Parts Center" and established many friends in business and auto racing. After retirement, they moved to Port Aransas, Texas, and she continued serving socially through Keep Port Aransas Beautiful, (KPAB) as a past president, the PA Garden Club, and the Port Aransas Kiwanis Club.

Marilyn is remembered as a loving wife and mother to daughter Julie Miller and husband Brett; son James Leonard and wife Melanie, and three beloved grandchildren, Lauren Miller Gallaher

and husband John, Amanda Miller, and Greyson Leonard.

Visitation will be 9 a.m. to 8 pm, Monday, June 4, 2012 at Memorial Park Funeral Home in Oklahoma City, Okla. Services are 11 a.m. Tuesday, June 5, 2012, at First United Methodist Church of Edmond with burial to follow at Memorial Park Cemetery. Sparger Bros. Tobacco continued from another issue...

Elberta was just one of several brand names given to the plug tobacco manufactured by Sparger Brothers. They are thin metal tags (tin?) and would be utilized to identify the buyer of batches of tobacco when sold by the farmer at tobacco auctions. There are avid tobacco tag collectors that have hundreds if not thousands of tags in their collections. (Not me!) I have only one (see attachment) that happens to be the Elberta brand as well.

The Sparger Brothers were my great grandfather James Henderson Sparger and his brother Benjamin Franklin Sparger. Both were sons of Murlin Sparger of Mount Airy, NC. The company went out of business around the turn of the twentieth century due to competition from the big boys, the Duke's American Tobacco Co & R. J. Reynolds, etc. The buildings in Mount Airy built to house the Sparger Brothers factory are still in use in the garment industry (or what's left of it in this country) and may just be the largest buildings in town. I am sure that others know a helluva lot more about Mount Airy and the tobacco industry from that period. My grandfather sold his interest in the tobacco company and Sparger Brothers Orchard Co. (apples) and moved to Elkin, NC and a couple of years later to Greensboro, NC.

In the early 1940's Daddy, Hubert Lewis Wolfenbarger, had a western swing band and radio program. He went by the name of Jack Wolfe and his band was called "Jack Wolfe and the Texas Wranglers". He wrote "Down the Sunset Trail" for his radio show on KPPC in Pasadena, California. He called it a little "ditty".

Between 1947 and 1948 Mama and Daddy separated and he just knew he had lost her forever so he wrote "You're As Sweet as the Roses" for her. Her name was Mary Madeline Baker but she was always called Madeline. To my knowledge Daddy never sang this song after they reconciled. When asked he would just ignore you. Mama taught me both songs and when I realized that I was the last person alive that knew them I had them copyrighted.

Charlotte Note from the Editor: The lyrics are contained in this newsletter.

I always share our newsletters with my sister Romaine Edwards.

Our mother was Pearl Wolfersberger and was married to our father, Ralph H. Engle. I have been retired from the State of Pennsylvania as a construction project engineer. My sister has been retired from the Pennsylvania State Police as a Lieutenant. She is also a registered nurse.

Here is some history of our immediate family. Our mother's parents were Carrie and Christian Wolfersberger. They had ten children: Our mother Pearl, Mabel, Leah, Ruth, Sarah, Blanche, John, Robert Ward, Leroy & Paul. All are now deceased. All were originally from the Hummelstown, Pennsylvania area.

There is almost no news of our immediate Wolfersberger family. I am now near 77 years of age, my sister is eight years younger than I am.

Olin Junior Wolfingbarger passed away on September 13, 2013. He had celebrated his 85th birthday on June 25th at his home in Blythe, California. Junior, as he was known, was the Son of **Olin F and Jessie Wolfinbarger** of Chino, California.

Junior was the owner of O.J. Wolfinbarger Hay Inc. in Blythe, California. He was a lifetime member of the Foursquare Church. He was also a member of Gideon's and past President of the Kiwanis Club. He loved living by the river and enjoyed watersports. Junior owned and flew a Beechcraft Bonanza for many years. He was always an outdoors person and raised and rode mules as a hobby.

Olin was a Man that put God and his family first in his life. He was married to Vera for 62 years until she preceded him in death in 2009. They had 4 children, 10 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great grandchild.

Junior lived life with grace and style and it was fitting that his casket was carried through town to his final resting place in a hearse pulled by a white horse.

QUERY

Greetings. I visited the WFA site and found your email address. My grandfather's mother was Alice Hill Wolfenbarger Longmire, daughter of Sterling Franklin Wolfenbarger of Grainger, Tennessee. My grandfather's grandmother was Louverna Wolfenbarger Longmire, daughter of Peter Wolfenbarger (b. 1812) of Grainger, Tennessee. In other words, my grandfather married a cousin, very common then?

First, I find that Merrill's wife is a Louvenia Wolfenbarger (many spellings). She is shown as Lou. All of the records I have found show their children's surname as Longmire.

Son Sterling's full name was Sherman Sterling Longmire. Some say Sherman Sterling Tecumseh Longmire and called "Tut". I have no proof of that as yet. He married Alice Paralee Hill on 27 Dec 1887 in Union County, Tennessee. She was the daughter of Christopher Columbus Hill and Rhoda Ann Walters. You will find Alice at home on the 1870 Union County, Tn. Census and the 1880 Union County census. You will find Sterling and Alice's full names on the Delayed Birth Certificate of their daughter Stella.

The only place I have found where Alice's parents were Sterling Longmire and Mary Hill is on her death certificate. A death certificate is only as accurate as the memory of the one answering questions. My grandfather's death certificate has 6 mistakes. I can make corrections but it would cost me at least \$70.00. Since I can prove who he was from other records I won't bother.

Merrill and Lou had a daughter named Alice Victoria that married W. M. Collingsworth in Union County on 1 Sep 1900. This is the only daughter Alice I have found for a Longmire of this branch of the family.

I have found a great deal of information about Merrill and Lou's branch of the family using records found on Ancestry and Familysearch.org. Hope this was helpful.

Well, goes to show the dangers of jumping to conclusions prematurely. I had my great grandmother's mother pegged as an adulterer in order to make all the dates add up. I searched a family genealogy book called Union Hill and Sarah Martin Hill; Ancestors and Descendants, expecting to find Christopher Columbus Hill among my ancestors

but he's not listed. I'll do some online searching for him; he may be outside the family.

Meantime, there is some confusion about two Sterling's. Sterling Sherman Tecumseh Longmire was my grandfather Henry Longmire's father. My mother knew him and described him often. But Louvena Wolfenbarger Longmire (Merrill's wife) had a brother named Sterling Franklin Wolfenbarger, so apparently she named her son Sterling Sherman after him. So when I was told Alice's full name was Alice Hill Wolfenbarger and her death certificate named Sterling Wolfenbarger (not Longmire as Charlotte understood) as her father, I assumed Sherman (as my mother always called him) had married his cousin. My grandfather Henry married Flossie Hill, so I also theorized that they were possibly second cousins. My aunts and uncles insist that Alice was a Wolfenbarger; so did my mother before her death. The connection is pretty obscure at this point.

I remember my grandfather's sister Stella from childhood. I don't know what a Delayed Birth Certificate is but I'll look into it. I'm glad to have some more names to work with. Most of my information is from Rootsweb, some from FindaGrave. The local library has a genealogy room and I've found a couple of useful books there as well. Thanks to you both for

devoting so much time to my questions. I'll keep looking into the Jewish connection and if I find good evidence, will pass it on to you. --Tess Haft

A delayed birth certificate means that the birth of the child wasn't registered at time the child was born. Sometimes the family couldn't get by the courthouse. Stella's was filed on 9 June 1956 and approved on 13 June 1956 in Union County, Tennessee. She had to have more proof than just the word of her parents so in addition to them they filed a birth record from the Family Bible and affidavits from a relative and non relative. In this case the relative was Aunt Lety Longmire and the non relative G. P. Richardson. There is a copy of the certificate on Ancestry. I will gladly send you a copy if you will send me your address. By the way, from what I can learn about Stella I don't think she ever married -- did she? I will be happy to help you in any way I can.

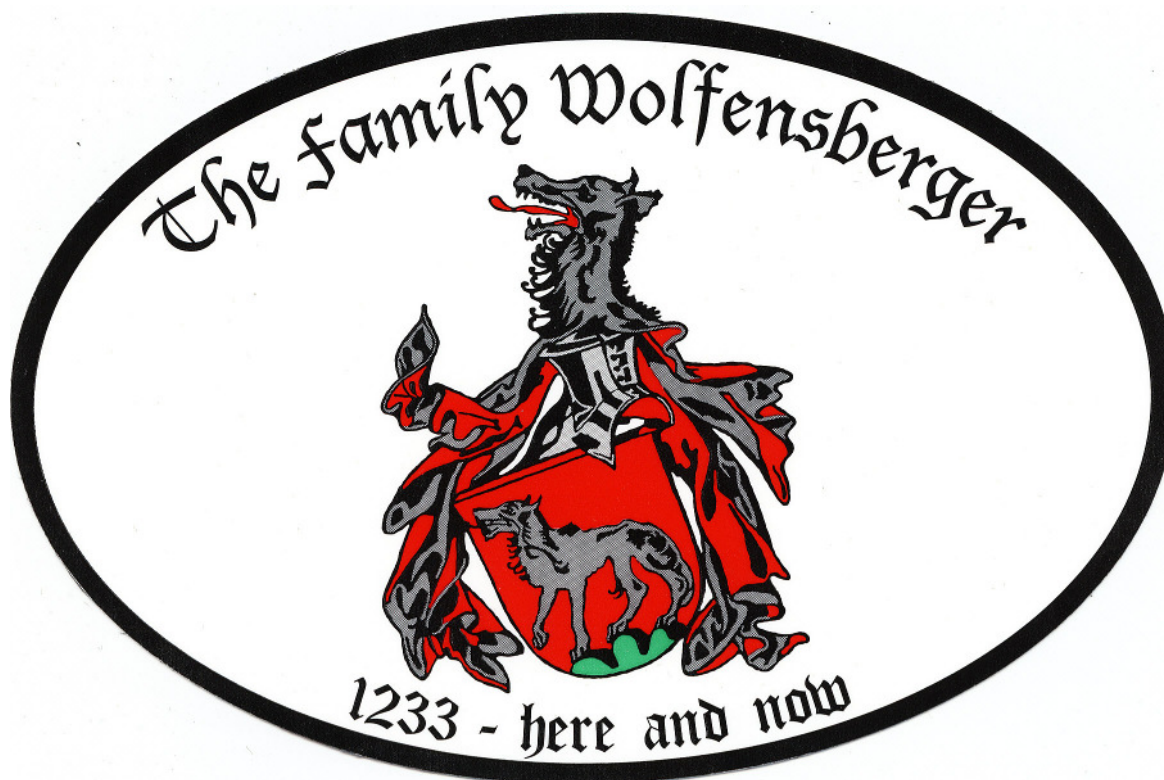
