The Way West: By Covered Wagon From Oklahoma to Western Colorado

The following is based on reminiscences by Ola Wolfenbarger and the late Dr. D. O. Wolfenbarger, sons of Peter and Susie Wolfenbarger, about their travels from 1914 to 1915 by covered wagon from northeastern Oklahoma to Hotchkiss, in western Colorado.

"It was the late spring of 1914 when the doctor told my father he probably would not live unless he did something about it. The doctor told him to sell everything and get a wagon and some good horses and live outdoors for a few years.

"My mother's insistence that we move was so strong that it motivated my grandmother, three aunts. two uncles and two cousins to form the traveling group. Three canvascovered wagons and a total of 14 men, women and children made up the caravan. Railroads at the time were inconvenient and impractical.

"The day we left Oklahoma was a happy day for all of us. We were glad to be leaving Oklahoma because it seemed we kids caught every disease that came around.

"First stop was Coffeyville, Kansas. My mother's sister lived in Spring Arrived Coffeyville, which was just over the state line in Kansas. We stayed warmer weather, we formed up the there a couple of days visiting. There, our cousin took both of us to journey to western Colorado. As a movie, the first one we had ever seen. It was very striking for us Oklahoma Sooners to see men and other things moving on a theater wall.

"It was striking, too, for us to

see the treeless areas of Kansas. The hills had disappeared. The flat areas were covered with short grass, and small farms. Roads ran straight, without curves. Mile after mile of the country was flat-grass covered, without running streams.

"We passed through Wichita, Kingman, Pratt and Dodge City. Then someone suggested proceeding to Garden City, where there was a sugar factory and where some of us could find work. We put up in Garden City for the winter, where our father rented a dugout, a house with about one-half its height under Pueblo. Very soon we moved on ground

"There, Ola came down with smallpox and a life-threatening high fever. There, too, the school age children attended school in the winter. We saw some differences between our Oklahoma schools and the Garden City schools. The Sooner schools we attended were small, one-room affairs with one teacher, where each student learned from the lessons of more advanced classes. In Garden City, the classes were separated, where the children in the room all had the same lesson.

"When spring arrived with caravan again and continued our we traveled west, the blue haze of the distant mountains soon gave way to clearly visible rock formations. We traveled down a rocky gorge along the river. In some places the gorge was tight. In oth-

ers the river was wider and made room for a country store, dwelling

"As we headed west, we were climbing rather steadily, increasing our altitude. Fortunately, there was no wagon trouble and no harness broken on the trip. After passing through Lamar, Colorado, we camped one night close to a small town. During the night there was a lot of shooting, yelling and carrying-on, so the folks were kind of worried. The next town was Vineland, a little town east of up into the mountains west of Canon City.

"Before we reached Salida, our mother complained she couldn't breathe and get enough oxygen. We turned around and returned to Vineland. The other two wagons went on to Salida and waited there for us. When we thought Mother could withstand the high altitude, we caught up with the other wagons, then crossed Monarch Pass, 11,312 feet high. This was in August, but in the higher elevations, snow still remained on the ground.

In the clear, dry air, we could see for miles, east and west. We enjoyed the drive from Salida to Gunnison. We followed the Gunnison River for a distance, then took a narrow road along the side of Black Mesa. It was a poor road whose outer edge in places was only inches from the edge of the cliff over what is now the Black Canvon of the Gunnison. Below us a thou-

"I'll never forget that day. The breaks in the mountain. Gunnison River and the railroad track at the bottom seemed miles below us in the canyon. The road, I am sure, was made with a pick and shovel. It was just a few inches wider than the wagon wheels. It was scary. I was scared and so was Mother, but she took the reins in her hands and started out with the rest of the wagons alon the Black Canyon of the Gunnison. We

inched along for miles until we came to the margin of Black Mesa and began our descent through

"A few miles ahead lay our destination: Hotchkiss. By this time, we had run out of both money and food. Since we were in a forested area of the mesa, my father went out hunting and brought back a porcupine, which we dressed. cooked and ate. With day, we rolled out of camp one last time, making Hotchkiss by the end of day.

Memories From A Famous Family Historian: George Wolfersberger

George Wolfersberger was one of our family's best genealogists. Much of his research was done while he was an employee of the Ford Motor Company in Detroit. This article pays tribute to a man who worked for many years to research his family history.

robably his biggest disappointment was not being able to successfully research his family in Europe, although he wrote many letters to Europe in this effort. George knew that his great grandfather. Martin, came to America from the area of Hertzviller in the Moselle River region of France.

Hertzviller is about 48 km (30) miles) from Strasbourg, George was born 2 October 1919 near Mascoutah, Illinois to Julius Wolfersberger and Elizabeth Laquet and died 24 June 1992 in Ironton, Missouri, and buried in the Mascoutah. Illinois Cemetery. George married Aguina Dantzer and to this marriage a son Charles and a daughter Anne was born.

I spent some time researching this family while I was in France in 1994, but with no success. The International Genealogical Index as published by the LDS Church has some information on the Wolfersberger family in the area of Hertzviller, France. This information appears to be correct and is found in Library Call #1553302. Batch # 2360275, Sheets 8 and 23.

This IGI information shows a Martin Wolfersberger born in 1800 in Hartzviller, Moselle. France whose father was Charles, born about 1780 in Hartzviller, whose father Martin, born about 1757 in Hartzviller, whose father George. born about 1735 in Hartzviller. Before these persons and dates can be taken as fact there needs to be further investigation.

George had one son. Charles, that is an engineer in Saint Louis. MO. It is through Charles that I have obtained the information for this article.

Exerpts of the paper by George widow married a man named Wolfersberger is as follows:

"Martin Wolfersberger, his wife Katherine Sherrer and a five year old son, Franz, came from Lorraine to America in the year 1843. They entered this country at New Orleans and came up the Mississippi River on a flatboat to St. Louis, Missouri. First they settled in French Village, Illinois, then moved to a farm two miles north of years old also due to small pox. A Mascoutab, Illinois in Saint Clair County. Martin was born in January Michael and Louisa had nine chil-1800 in Hartzviller, France and died 27 February 1860. Katherine died in 1880. Both are buried in the Anna; Emil; Mary; August; Otto; old Catholic Cemetery two miles west of Mascoutah, Illinois.

"Katherine had a brother that came to Saint Clair County four years previously. Undoubtedly he influenced his sister and her husband to leave Europe and come to America.

"Martin and Katherine had the

following children: Franz, born December 1838 in Hartzviller, France, died March 1870; Michael, born January 1844, died 23 October 1911; Christina, born May 1849, died February 1903; Joseph, born April 1850, died January 1882; Caroline, born 1854, died 1944; Lillian, no information.

"Franz married Elizabeth Hulling. He died at the age of 32 with small pox. Apparently they had two children Christine, born 1865 and Marcel, born 1867. These children are listed in the 1870 census. After the death of Franz his Boehm who had two children by a previous marriage. They moved to California.

"Michael married Louisa Braun who was born in Stuttgart, Germany who came to America with her parents. Louis was three years old when her mother died in New Orleans due to an epidemic. Her father took her to Saint Louis where he died when she was eleven family named Seifert raised Louisa. dren who were Frank; Julius, born 4 June 1870., died 29 June 1944; Ottilie and Lucy.

"Christina married Nicholas Poirot of Belleville, Illinois, Their children were Louisa, Carolina, Edmund, Anna, Otto, Raymond, Walter, Adolph, Oscar and Edna.

"Joseph married Margaret Hopfinger. He died at the age of 32

"Caroline married August Staub. They had three children Her- in this country, but we did have one bert, Edmund and Tinna. Caroline then married Julius Christ and they had six children, Erwin, Oliver, Lorraine, Edward, Henry and Lawrence.

"Lillian married Anton Jung of Murphysboro, Illinois. They had five children Minnie, August, Anton, Sigmund and Julius.

"Julius, the son of Michael and Louisa, married Elizabeth Laquet and they had six children, the voungest was George, born 2 October 1919 in Mascoutah, Illinois,

A Final Note

"This is the last revision that I will ever make of the Wolfersberger family history. It began in 1954 and is ending in 1984.

"I can feel the chill wind of the born. autumn of my life, and watch the leaves slowly drifting to the ground, from which they came.

"I have spent countless hundreds of hours on this history, hours never complete. which I perhaps should have spent with my wife and children when they were young.

"There were many trips to libraries in Chicago, Jackson, Ohio and to the downtown libraries of Detroit. I have spent many hours visiting and talking to different people, some of which I never knew before.

"I have stood by the graves of many people that once had the name of Wolfersberger. At least one* family member fought in the

Revolutionary War. That trip alone cost me a week out of my life - and I shed tears when I stood there at his burial site. We were not related thing in common. A name.

"I have derived much pleasure and a grand sense of accomplishment for the past 30 years, and now it has come to an end.

I met two brothers** in the late 50s who came to America for a visit. They came from Switzerland to Detroit and I found them after searching for three days in the downtown hotels. Can you imagine how I felt when I met these men our families have been apart since the 1500s, when my ancestor left that country and migrated to Lorraine.

I only ask two things. Keep this history for your generations to come, and keep up making additions to the history as new ones are

Even as I write this, new children are being born, and some of the others are preparing to leave this world. A family history is

Over the past year I have received several requests for information concerning a Sparger family without an apparent connection to Jour Sparger family. All of the Sparger or Spargur families that I have heard of were of our family.

Two inquiries have come from members of our association. They are Earline Bailey Cross of 1240 W. Cheryl Ave, Hurst, TX 76053 and Marietta Stallard of 2723 Seneca Hollow Road, Elliston, VA 24087.

Their research shows the 1860 census for Walker County, Georgia lists a Samuel Sparger age 48. farmer, born in VA, died 12 Jan 1893 in Colleyville, Tarrant, TX and buried in the Smithfield Cemetery, Tarrant County, TX. His spouse was Susan (last name unknown), Their oldest son was Harvey Richard Sparger, born 16 Oct 1833 in Marion County, TN. He died 15 Feb 1914 and is buried in the Smithfield Cemetery, Tarrant County, TX. Harvey Richard spouse was Mary Ann Hamilton.
