

North Carolina's Highways Multiplied When J. B. Was 'The Good Roads Man'

In Search For Family's Roots, They Swing Through Switzerland

Recently, my sister Carolyn and I took an escorted tour of Germany and Austria that ended with a three-day swing through Switzerland's Zurich canton, the Wolfensberger ancestral home.

Before leaving home, we made arrangements to have a guide to take us to Rapperswil, Ruti and Bauma in a search for our roots.

First we went to Rapperswil to see the old section of the city and its medieval fort. From there we were driven south to Ruti, where we searched for the monastery associated with the medieval Wolfensberger family.

As soon as I saw a church building marked, "Cloisterhaus", I knew this was the place we were looking for — even if it appeared to be a new church. We entered the church just as services were ending. Our guide went inside to ask if we could tour the church. The answer, happily, was yes we could.

The only person remaining

after the service was a Herr Wust, the church organist. He was a very charming person but he did not speak English and we did not speak German, so were glad to have an interpreter. Our guide asked him if he knew of any Wolfensbergers. Mr. Wust said, "Oh, there were a couple here from America a few years ago looking for the same family."

None in Ruti

I concluded that there is no current family member who is a member of the Ruti church. (I found a lot of Wolfensbergers listed in the Zurich and Munich telephone books.)

Herr Wust informed us that the church was once Moravian but is now simply a Protestant church. An old cemetery once connected to the church no longer exists. The historic church has been remodeled, so the front part is new, but the back part — including the alter — is left from the old church. In that part also remain stone tablets showing the varied coats of arms of older

Memories of Joseph Bingman Sparger, better known around his hometown of Mount Airy, North Carolina as "J. B." are still vivid among Surry County old-timers when they get together to reminisce about the development of early roads and orchards in this corner of rural North Carolina.

For J.B. Sparger was prominently connected with both road-building and orchard development in the region around Mount Airy. He is widely regarded as a visionary who saw the potential for apple and peach orchards on the slopes of nearby Slate Mountain. Later, he developed large tracts of land on the slopes there for orchards.

members of the church.

Herr Wust showed us a German-language history of the church containing photos of the coats of arms. He asked me if I could identify the "Wolfensberger" arms. I quickly picked out the one that most resembled the arms I recalled. He quickly checked the

But J. B. is best remembered for his record of distinguished civic activity. Considered by many to be one of Surry County's most progressive citizens, he left an enviable legacy of distinguished service to the people of his state and county.

Over the years, J. B. served on the Mount Airy board of education, the city water and light commission, and the Surry County Board of Commissioners. Early this century, he was chairman of the Surry County Highway Commission.

To many in this region, J. B.'s tenure as chairman of the highway commission is still remembered as an unrivaled period of improvement in the county's highways and roads.

In the early 1900s, Surry County, like most rural counties, had few bridges and almost no roads passable in bad weather.

Bridge Builder

As highway commission chairman, J. B. led the movement to improve the county's infrastructure of bridges and highways. In one year alone, he directed the construction of no less than 40 county bridges.

Throughout his tenure, no "good roads" meeting in the region was quite complete without his attendance. He traveled widely with delegations to state and federal highway meetings to gain approval

of road improvement projects for his region.

Unofficially, he was popularly known as the "good roads man" from Surry County.

J. B. lived to see most of his goals in road improvement carried out, but he maintained a lively interest in the region's economic development even after he retired from active government service.

In 1924, J. B. was named Mount Airy's postmaster, a position he held until 1936. During his term of office, the Federal government built Mount Airy's present Post Office. As a public official, J. B. demanded the best of buildings for his town.

J. B. Sparger was born November 22, 1874 at the old Sparger home near the present Sparger Orchard. He died in Mount Airy at the age of 82 on September 13, 1966.

In 1892, J. B. married Elizabeth Valeria Case. Together the couple had six children. Included was Margaret, Randall W. Sr., William E., Collier Bryson, Mary and Eloise. J. B. was the son of William Simpson Sparger and Sarah M. Witcher and was the great grand son of John Wolfersberger-Sparger.

The renovated family home of Guy Mitchell Sparger and Mary Sparger in North Carolina was prominently featured in a recent issue of the nationally-distributed *Country Living Magazine*, which shows the beauty and detail of this farm home and surrounding grounds in an expansive photo spread.

After retiring in 1988, Guy Sparger and his wife, Mary, returned to his childhood home, situated on a 50 acre farm in Mount Airy, North Carolina.

The farm house was originally built by Guy's father in 1924. The main structure needed a substantial amount of work to bring it up to date, including rewiring, repainting and re-roofing.

"We had to re-everything", explained Guy. The addition of a brand-new kitchen/great room and a master bedroom suite now completes the farmhouse, which serves as an appropriate setting for the couple's collections of antique furniture and folk art.

"After living in the city for so many years, it is nice to have space in which to move around," says Mary, whose shop, M. Sparger Antiques, is also on the property.

Guy is a third great-grandson of the original John Wolfersberger-Sparger-Spargar who was born in Virginia in 1754 and came to the Mount Airy area around 1800.

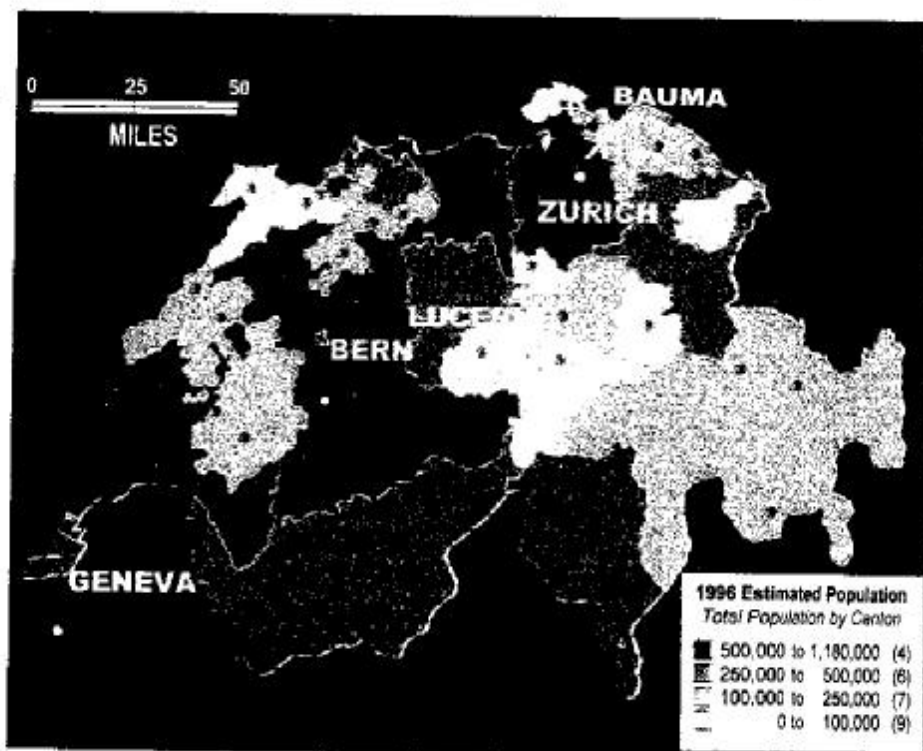

The Spargur Reunion Song Lives On, Tunefully

Several attractive qualities seem to distinguish the Spargur-Sparger family from many other families.

Some say it is because the Spargur-Sparger family is a close-knit family, and point to well-attended 19th Century reunions that brought dozens of families great distances to gather for an annual celebration.

Others say it's because the family seems to have an ear for music. They point to a reunion song, predictably called "The Spargur Reunion" that was sung at 19th Century gatherings and handed down from father -- or mother -- to son or daughter.

Some members believe the Spargur reunion song was written for a long-ago reunion -- perhaps for the first such gathering in 1875.

Over the years family memories

of the words and melody began to fade. But that universal family ear for music brought it back to life in the 20th Century.

According to family legend, the music was originally composed by Milton Spargur, whose father, Philip, was one of the brothers of Joseph Wolfensberger, who was the first scion to bear the Spargur name in the early 19th Century. The words were written by Milton's niece, Nancy Sinclair Redkey, daughter of Milton's sister, Mary Spargur Sinclair.

For years, the words and music remained unwritten but a vivid memory in the head of Elizabeth Scott. Recalling the reunions of her youth, Elizabeth sang the song to her son, Harold Spargur, who hastily jotted down the notes and chords in the only written

musical arrangement of the song known to exist.

Years later in 1990, another Spargur genealogy student with an ear for music, Vendrell L. Spargur of Dayton, Ohio, updated the arrangement at a time when the Spargur-Sparger-Wolfensberger clan, now strewn far and wide, are unlikely ever to gather for such a huge reunion.

"The Spargur Reunion" isn't likely to become a platinum record. Nor is it ever going to be memorable music to the pop music world. But the family may find it still lives with its four verses and chorus that talk of timeless values.

As the song's chorus notes, "With joy we hail this gladsome day, for this we call our jubilee; We'll laugh and talk and sing and play and pass the time right merrily."

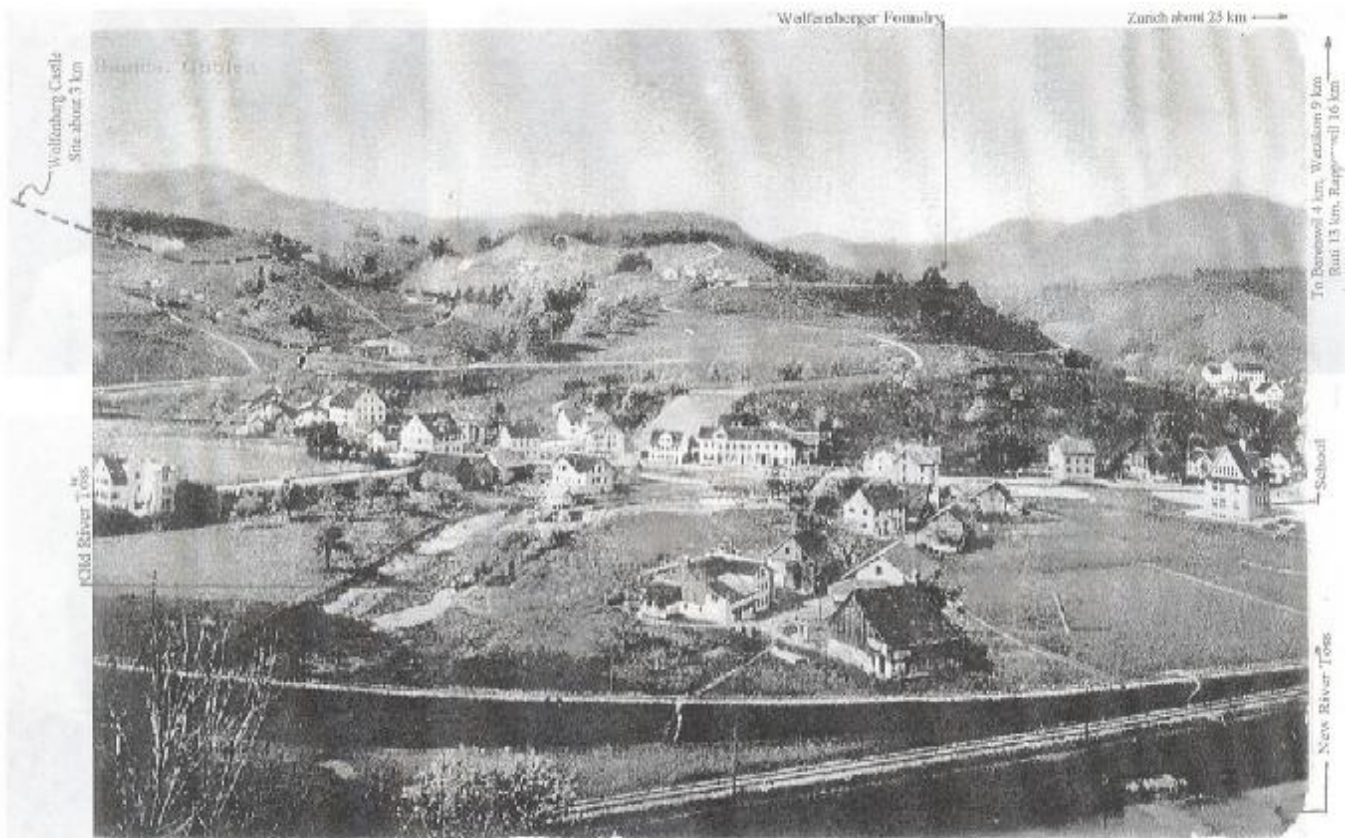

Richard Evans' Family History Looks At Sparger Family Line

The newest author of a Wolfensberger/Sparger family history is Richard L. Evans of Houston, who recently published "A Search For Family", a book that looks beyond the Wolfensberger and Sparger families to other families in his family tree.

Richard Lindsay Evans, son of Thomas Homer Evans and Vivian Aiken, was born January 28, 1929 in Waco, Texas.

He is a descendant of John W. Sparger and Sarah Lyon of Surry County, North Carolina, whose youngest child was Mary Sparger, born May 31, 1834. She married Thomas Evans in January 1854 in the home of her brother Merlin in Surry County.

In October 1885, the Thomas Evans family moved to Fannin County, Texas with their family of 14 children. Their eighth, my grandmother Mary Katherine Evans, married James Nelson Evans (no relation) on December 24, 1891, in Texas.

Richard L. Evans attended La Vega Schools in Bellmead, Texas, before enlisting in the U. S. Navy in February 1946. He served a two-year enlistment, then returned to attend Parsons Junior College. Transferring to Kansas State College, he graduated from KSU in 1952 with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering.

After college, Evans worked briefly for the Electro-Motive Division of General Motors in LaGrange, Illinois, and the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad in Topeka, Kansas.

In a 34-year career with Texaco, he rose from a position as a lubrication engineer in Los Angeles through the sales ranks, becoming district manager for sales in Minneapolis in 1968. He later became assistant manager in the New York office in 1976 before moving to Houston in 1978. He remained in sales management until his retirement in 1987.

"Dood" Wolfenbarger, Who Died In '87, Lives On As Bowling Great

Dewey Wolfenbarger is perhaps the family's only member enshrined in the Bowling Hall of Fame.

Born May 15, 1899 in Bethpage, Missouri, Dewey Francis Wolfenbarger, was the ninth of 12 children born to James Peter Wolfenbarger and Alameda Crawford. In turn, James Wolfenbarger was the second of 11 children born to William Walker Wolfenbarger and Katherine Brock.

Raised in Stella, Missouri, Dewey attended school there, but left the state when he was 15 to work in Montana, Colorado and Wyoming.

Dewey married Louise A. Linse on May 12, 1919 in Basin, Wyoming, and later moved to Boise, Idaho, where they lived for 54 years. Dewey died December 31, 1987, at the age of 88. Louise preceded Dewey in death in March 1985.

Dewey and Louise had one son, James D., and a daughter, Opal Wolfenbarger Howerton. Both still live in Boise. James married Allene Simpson and Opal married Kenneth Howerton. Opal and Kenneth have one son, Ronald, and one daughter, Patricia Ann.

Dewey and Louise were members of the University Christian Church. Their faith was evident to all those close to them and every casual acquaintance.

Samuel Sparger: Family Mystery Man?

For thirty years I've searched for clues to the life of Samuel Sparger, my great-great-grandfather. I've lived every day of my life within a short walk of his last home. I've worked twenty years within earshot of his grave. And I study his face in a full-length seated studio portrait of him.

INFORMATION NEEDED

Still, I know nothing of Samuel Sparger.

Samuel Sparger's gravestone notes simply that he died on January 12, 1893, at the age of 83.

He told census takers he was born in Virginia. He never learned to write and he never owned a plot of real estate. He confessed he could read English but couldn't write it.

When I first began my genealogical studies, few of his great-grandchildren remembered much about Samuel. They recall only that he was a disagreeable man with a quick temper.

Samuel Sparger's wife was named Susan. She was born in about 1815 in Tennessee, and probably married Samuel in 1832 somewhere in Tennessee. She was still alive in Walker County, Georgia in 1880, and probably lies buried in an unmarked grave near

Chickamauga, Georgia.

Based upon what I've learned, Samuel lived in only four places during his lifetime: Virginia, Tennessee, Georgia and Texas. He was born somewhere in Virginia around 1809. By the early 1830's, he lived in Marion County, Tennessee, where he remained until about 1858. Then he moved his family to the Crawfish Springs/Chickamauga area of Walker County, Georgia, where he continued to live with Susan until 1880. After 1880 — and after the death of Susan (possibly as late as 1892) — he moved to Tarrant County, Texas. There he stayed with his son Harvey Sparger, his daughter Jane Sparger Garrett, and his grandchildren. Samuel died in Tarrant County, Texas.

Samuel's and Susan's eldest son was my ancestor, Harvey Richard Sparger. He was born in Marion County, Tennessee on October 16, 1833.

The couple had eleven other children. They included Thomas Sparger (1835 - 1920) who later settled in Erath County, Texas; Robert "Bob" Sparger (1836 - 1889); Josiah "Joe" Sparger (b.ca 1836 - 1889) and George Washington Sparger (1847 - 1912), all of whom lived in Walker County, Georgia.

Other children included Samuel B. Sparger (b.ca 1849), who lived in Walker County as late as 1900; Barbara Elizabeth Sparger

outstanding bowler, Dewey — better known as "Dood" — was also a successful horseshoe pitcher, golfer and fisherman.

Before moving to Idaho, Dewey and Louise owned a farm in Everson, Montana, some 100 miles downstream on the Missouri River, and some 30 miles north of the rural community of Denton, Montana.

One warming winter day, suffering from cabin fever, Dewey and Louise set out one day to see a movie in Denton. The thawing dirt road was slick and muddy, but

Dewey had loaded wheat in the back of his Model-T truck to give it added traction. But that wasn't enough. Shoveling mud to free the lightweight Model T, Dewey and Louise struggled 13 hours to reach Denton, by which time the movie had closed.

Dewey and Louise loved to sing. They and their neighbors staged a lot of singing get-togethers in their home. Dewey would play the guitar, banjo or harmonica while Louise played the piano. That's the way it was then. Everyone made their own entertainment in those days.

as 1900; Barbara Elizabeth Sparger (b.ca 1841) who married a Baldwin and remained in Walker County; Nancy Mahala Sparger (b.ca 1845) who married Marshall Silver and later moved to Rusk County, Texas; Louisa Jane Sparger who married Rappley "Rap" Garrett and later moved to Tarrant County, Texas; Susan Sparger (b.ca 1851), Mary Sparger (b.ca 1853), and Richard Sparger (b.ca 1855).

Confederate Sons

At least four Sparger sons — Harvey Sparger, Thomas Sparger, Josiah Sparger and their brother-in-law, Marshall Silver -- fought in the Civil War, serving in Confederate Army units in Georgia.

After Susan Sparger died, family members in Georgia contacted Harvey Sparger in Texas. Harvey returned to Walker County, Georgia to get his father and bring him back to Texas to live. We do not know when he died, or how long Samuel lived in Texas before he died in early 1893. He is not included in a family photograph made in front of Harvey's home sometime in 1891.

The single surviving photograph of Samuel Sparger was taken at a photographer's studio in Fort Worth, Texas. How lucky I am to have it!

When Samuel's last illness began, he was living at the home of his granddaughter, Margaret Rogers. Seriously ill, he was taken

to the home of his eldest son, Harvey, where he died in present-day Colleyville, Texas, of pneumonia on January 12, 1893. Samuel was buried in the south edge of Smithfield Cemetery, just a few feet from the railroad right-of-way.

I may never learn the names of the parents of Samuel or Susan Sparger. They are classic examples of the "brick-wall" syndrome in genealogy. One of Samuel's own grandchildren, born in 1857 and who probably saw her grandparents daily until about 1880, didn't even know Susan's maiden name.

POSSIBLE LINK: John W. Sparger, Jr., born in 1778 in Freiburg, North Carolina, married Sarah Lyon in Hillsville, Carroll County, Virginia in 1816. John Sparger was 38 at the time of his marriage. Carroll County, Virginia is across the state line from Surry County, North Carolina.

What was John doing for these 38 years? No record has ever been found of a previous marriage or a child. Could John have had a child by a previous marriage?

Granddad Died In Civil War Battle of Shiloh, Descendent Remembers

My uncles and aunts still recall the words of my grandfather, James A. Hopkins, as he paced the floor of the family farm during the final winter of his life, "My daddy was a Wolfenbarger," he said. "He died in the Battle of Shiloh during the Civil War".

The family farm near Mulberry Gap, Tennessee, was next to a farm owned by a Steven Hopkins, Jr. His daughter Margaret Hopkins and Steven Wolfenbarger, Wilkinson's son, grew up as close friends. married and had two sons: Columbus and James A. Wolfenbarger.

After Steven died in the Civil War, sons Columbus and James lived with their mother, Margaret, at their grandfather Hopkins' house. Together they crossed the Cumberland Mountains to settle in Wallins Creek, Kentucky. There in 1865 Margaret ran away to marry an Elf Simpson, leaving her two sons to be raised by their maternal grandfather.

Recognizing his new responsibility, Grandfather Hopkins asked the court to legally change the names of Columbus and James from Wolfenbarger to Hopkins. Hence by a twist of fate we are named Hopkins instead of Wolfenbarger.

From Wallins Creek, Grandfather Hopkins and his family later moved to Broadhead, Kentucky, and then to Blanchester, Ohio, where I was born and raised.
