THE FIVE YEAR-OLD Wolfensberger Family Association is electing new leadership for the year 2000. Any member is welcome to participate in running the association with its expanding international connections.

This issue of the family newsletter contains a ballot listing 13 nominees for membership in the

WFA's Board of Directors in the year 2000. But a line at the bottom of the ballot is left blank for you to write in the name of any nominee who is a paid member of the association.

Two new members

Two of the 13 nominees are prospective new board members.

● **Albert H. Creasy**, now of

Tryon, North Carolina, is a former insurance agency executive who wrote an article about another Spargur family descendant who, as an Army general, headed the U.S. Army's Chemical Corps.

● **Rudolf "Rudi" Wolfensberger, PhD.**, is an attorney and notary in Solothurn, Switzerland, who earned his doctorate in law from the University of Zurich. His wife, Sylvia, is also president of a bank, the SOVISA Trust Company, Ltd. The couple have two children, Patrick and Nadja.

What are the qualifications to be a director?

The only fixed qualification is to be a paid member of the association. In addition, directors are typically students of family

Swiss Family History Volume is One of a Series of Histories

One consequence of the rise of the Darwinian theory of evolution in the 19th Century was a new interest in eugenics, a science that taught families to avoid genetically-tainted marriages and seek alliances instead that improved the heritable qualities of a family and nation.

In turn, the growing popularity of eugenics led to new interest in genealogy in German-speaking nations. From this interest arose a series of *Deutsche Geshlechterbuch* volumes devoted to families like the Wolfensberger family.

This is a series of small but thick books estimated to number about 100 volumes. Most, like our family's genealogical history, contain genealogies of several

families. Volume 65 of the *Deutsche Geshlechterbuch* series contains Wolfensberger family data, as far as it was known in 1929, when the book was published.

Since the family had no knowledge of its American descendants, it contains no American genealogy records. But it sheds a great deal of light on the family's forbears and offered tantalizing hints of the family's rich history.

The Wolfensberger family's history is cited in this reference: Koerner, B. & Amberger, F. (1929). *Deutsch-Schweizerisches Geschlechterbuch*, Vol. 4 It is Volume 65 of the *Deutsches Geschlechterbuch (Genealogisches*

Handbuch Burgerlicher Familien), edited by Bernhard Koerner, Gorlitz: C. A. Starke.

Each volume of the series is small, about 4.5 inches by 5.75 inches, and thick. Volume 65, containing our family's history, contains more than 800 pages. The Wolfensberger portion runs from pages 284 to 522, and from page 559 to 734, which is larger than sections relating to other Swiss-German families.

The Wolfensberger family history, as noted on page 739, was compiled by Paul Wolfensberger of Zurich. Paul Wolfensberger and my father, Friedrich, had a long correspondence and friendship. My father visited him in the 1930s.

One obvious shortcoming of the book lies in its ignorance of the history of emigrant families like the family of John Wolfensberger, who emigrated to the American colonies in 1730. But the family's American branch was not the only group of descendents it ignored.

Not included, for example, was my family branch that

emigrated during the Protestant Reformation from the largely Protestant area around Zurich to a Catholic region near Lucerne. Their goal was probably to remain Catholic.

Swabia and Alsace

My family branch later sent sub-branches to Swabia and to the Alsace, the beautiful region on the border of Germany and France. Later, the Alsace was lost to Germany during the Franco-Prussian War of 1870 and regained by the French after World War I. During the Thirty Years War (1618-1648) the Alsace belonged to France.

Our family's genealogical history contains little information about either Catholic or Protestant branches that emigrated to the Alsace. It is from one of these branches – a Protestant one – that the first American settlers came.

Returning to Volume 65, it should be of interest to learn who the other Swiss-German families were. One of these, the Lavater family, was particularly prominent. Johann Caspar Lavater (1741-

1801) became famous as an Enlightenment scientist, famed for *Von der Physiognomik* (About Physiognomy), a book that dealt with the human face and what it revealed about the person's mind. It was published in 1772.

Volume 65 also contains the genealogy of the Swiss Ammann family, from whom came Jacob Ammann, founder of the Amish religious sect that later settled in Pennsylvania.

Other families documented are the Finsler, Korner, Lutz, Michel and von der Crone families.

Hey, Paid Your WFA Membership Dues ?

My Summer Visit to Bauma

I WAS FORTUNATE TO TRAVEL TO EUROPE THIS SUMMER to preview a possible trip for my music students. In doing so, I was able to extend my stay and travel to Switzerland to view the site of our ancestral home, Bauma.

Should any of you have an opportunity to visit the Zuercher Oberland region of Switzerland, do so. Bauma is a truly beautiful village, and the roads to Bauma pass through a picturesque part of Zurich Canton. The area is typically alpine with tall green mountains, decorated houses and well-maintained public buildings, just as you might expect from a travel brochure.

In Bauma there is a *Wolfensbergerstrasse*, which is clearly marked that leads to the Wolfensberg, the twin peaks of a small mountain on which the family's castle once stood.

A rather steep, narrow mountain road leads up the Wolfensberg that most people will want to drive by car.

Without someone to assist, identifying the proper family sites and obtaining permission to park could be problematic. With Max to

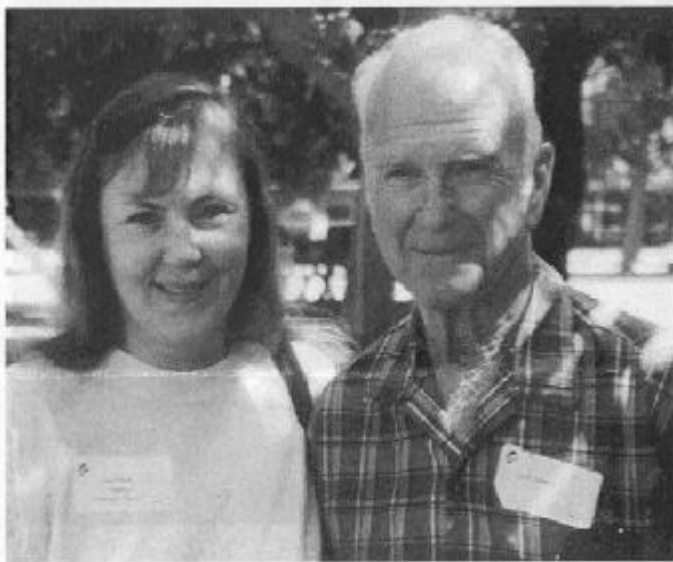

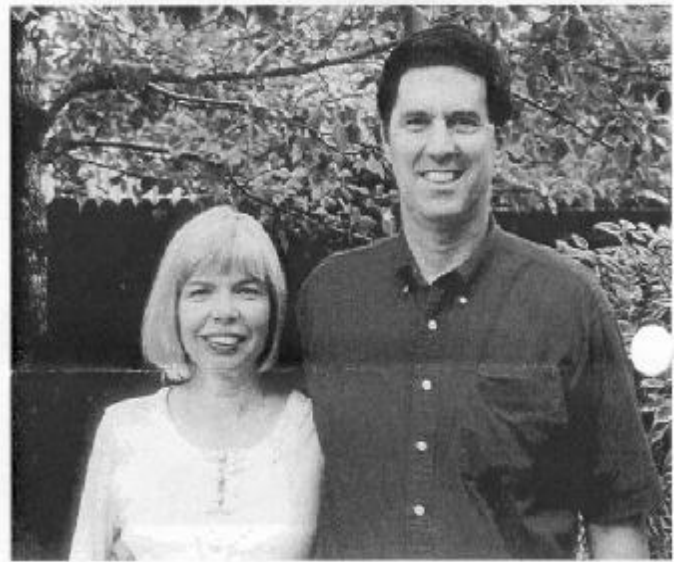

show the way and ask the owner's permission to be on the property, there were no problems. The people living on the Wolfensberg were very receptive.

The twin peaks of the Wolfensberg are studies in contrast. One hilltop, the higher of the two, could easily have been a lookout or site of a watchtower. It is cleared and has little vegetation except for grass. The second site, farther down the mountain, is heavily forested although it has a wide vista and is presumably the site where the fortress once stood.

Any visitor should be aware of a couple of historical issues before

they reach the site of the castle.

No Castle To See

First, the areas themselves are quite small compared to what one would expect from an existing structure in Europe. It should be remembered that all existing structures were built 200 to 300 years later than the family's onetime castle. During the time the castle existed, it was relatively small by today's standards.

Second, there is no castle or castle ruins to see. Not one stone. Not one timber. Nor should you expect to find castle ruins, because the ownership of the property has

changed many times.

When Max and I visited the castle site, it appeared as if someone had used it as a temporary camp. From appearances, it was probably kids who lived nearby.

Another tip: Be sure to wear comfortable walking and hiking shoes if you intend to visit the site.

Finally, I want to thank Max Wolfensberger for taking the time to act as tour guide. Max is proud of his homeland and his ancestry. Few people take the time that Max has devoted to discover and keep alive a family history. Max was a gracious host, and I genuinely appreciate his warm hospitality.

The Swiss Corner

In Switzerland, He's Called Baron Baldebreht

AS THIS NEWSLETTER HAS REPORTED, the family's lineage in Switzerland is traceable to the 13th Century and to a knight whose name has long been written as Baldebert.

But he's known in Switzerland's German dialect as Baldebreht, pronounced Baldebrecht. If our Swiss relatives could return to the 13th Century in a time machine, they could probably talk freely with each other.

Baldebreht spoke a variant of the Swiss-Deutsch spoken even by many Swiss in Zurich Canton.

We might also see the knight's name written at the dawn of Europe's medieval period as Baldebreht de Wolfsberg, a French expression used at the time that marks Baldebreht as an aristocrat. In German, of course, the word "von" precedes the names of German nobility.

KNIGHTS LIKE BALDEBREHT enjoyed one privilege over common foot soldiers who fought in the innumerable battles waged in and around Bauma.

Knights rode into war dressed in armoured suits atop warhorses,

bred to carry Swiss soldiers into battle.

In terms of noble rank, it is believed that Knight Baldebreht was either a baron or baronet. In the German states, a baron or baronet were of equal rank, unlike in the United Kingdom, where no one confused a baron with a baronet.

The familiar American term "robber baron" may actually have been drawn from the term for a baron who, as part of his position, was expected to collect tolls from caravans passing through their lands.

In England, a baron is a rough equivalent of an English lord or peer, according to experts.
