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Want to Visit Site of Family's Castle? Reserve 2001 to Come to Switzerland

IN JULY, the Bauma-based committee of the Wolfensberger Family Association planning a memorial at the site of the family's long-vanished castle reached a decision about the metal plaque describing the family's history.

The plaque, briefly describing the family's history in English and German, will be embedded in a rock somewhere at the site. It will quickly become the centerpiece of photography by visitors to the site of the former family castle just south of Bauma.

Bauma is a community of some 4,000 residents in Switzerland's Canton Zurich, located less than an hour east of the city of Zurich.

The decision to embed the plaque in a rock is the latest step in preparations to build a hiking path, barbecue and picnic area at the site.

Barring unforeseen circumstances, the pathway and site is expected to be completed by mid-2001, according to Heini Wolfensberger, head of the Bauma WFA committee planning the project.

The association is sharing costs of building the memorial with two Swiss-based organizations, the *Verkehrsverein Bauma*, the local tourism office, and the *Zuercher Wanderwege*, a cantonal hiking organization.

A pathway with stairs and a short land bridge will allow hikers to walk from the edge of a passing road to the former castle site, a walk of a few hundred yards.

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Kentucky's Estill County Confers Honor

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elected to six terms as Estill County Clerk, serving a total of 24 years, between 1942 and 1966, before retiring from a life of public service.

Prayer also played a key part in Maggie's life. She traces it to the influence of a woman whose home she visited often as a young girl.

At the age of four, Maggie moved with her parents to Irvine, Kentucky, where her father, a carpenter employed by the Estill County Board of Education, raised many of the county's one-room schoolhouses.

Walks to School

It was during her walks to one of these rural schools where Maggie learned for herself about the power of prayer. Enroute to school, she forded a shallow creek. Occasionally when the creek ran high, she was invited to stay overnight with a rural family living near the creek. While visiting the family, Maggie recalls the mother would pray with her children.

"She prayed at the dining room table, calling all of us children to pray with her before we went to school," recalls Maggie. "To this day it influences me."

After finishing school, Maggie was appointed postmistress of the nearby Ravenna Post Office.

After 14 years as a rural postmistress, she felt the influence of her early exposure to prayer. Taking the state's teachers examination, Maggie passed it and

applied for a position as a teacher in another rural school in nearby Breathitt County.

She decided after a year that teaching, after all, was not for her.

Walking to work one morning, she felt an "unseen person" walking with her.

A Transforming Letter

Arriving at school, Maggie checked her mail, finding a letter that would transform her life. The letter, from Estill County's sheriff, offered her a job in his office. So Maggie took the job, beginning a new life in public service that she would never leave.

Maggie was destined for better things. She went to a business college for two years and then began her quest for electoral office in the only elected position in which she would ever serve. In 1942, with the nation in the depths

of World War II, she ran for and was elected Estill County Clerk. Election of a woman at the time was a rare event.

"I prayed as I was appointed and prayed each morning before I opened the office to serve the people of Estill County," Maggie recalls.

Reelected Five Times

Reelected to five more terms, she credits three reasons for her victory. First, she prayed daily. Second, Maggie was honest. And third, she treated everyone fairly.

She summarizes the secret of her long life – and the success of her career as County Clerk – in a very simple statement. "In every walk of life I prayed and God has guided me day by day," she says. "After nearly a century, I have trusted our Savior who has never failed me."

500 Years Before U.S., Swiss Patriots Declare Independence

NEARLY 500 YEARS before America's founding fathers wrote their bold signatures across our Declaration of Independence, Switzerland's founders declared their own independence from Europe's Holy Roman Empire in 1291.

Just as we celebrate July fourth as the birth of American Independence, the Swiss celebrate August first. Only the sounds and sights differ slightly.

Late in the evening every August first, church bells ring out from the towns and villages of Switzerland to mark the anniversary of a similar historic gathering to protest foreign tyranny. Bonfires burn high on mountain slopes through the evening to celebrate the birth of the Swiss independence movement,

just as fires have blazed for centuries

Instead of meeting in a statehouse, angry Swiss residents of Uri, Schwyz and Unterwalden cantons gathered in the Ruetliwiese, a meadow on Lake

Lucerne safe from prying eyes.

Throughout the long night of August 1 the canton representatives discussed at length a list of grievances with their Austrian Hapsburg rulers. Among them: imposition of foreign judges and officials, escalating taxes and growing discrimination against the local peasantry.

At the end of the evening, representatives of the three Swiss

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Representatives of the cantons of Uri, Schwyz and Nidwalden gathered on August 1, 1291 to pledge their lives and fortunes to preserve their independence from foreign domination. In this painting, they agree to form a union of cantons to become independent of the Holy Roman Empire. The event is considered Switzerland's Independence Day, much as the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, is considered America's Independence Day.

After 6 Years as WFA Head,

Larry Deserves His Flowers Now!

I ONCE HEARD a man say, "I want to be given my flowers before I die."

Larry Jones, founder and president of the Wolfensberger Family Association, is a man who seeks no flowers. Nor does he relish any recognition of his lifetime of service.

If Larry had his wish, he'd go gently on his way serving other people without any expectation of praise or recognition.

Since we celebrate our fifth anniversary as a family association, it is fitting to recognize his achievements now. Since Larry submitted his resignation as president of the Association, this account of Larry's commitment to his family is appropriate.

Few of us will encounter a man with such a history of volunteer service as Larry Jones.

Larry's lifetime is filled with selfless dedication to family, country, community and the environment.

Larry is a private, unassuming, humble and accomplished man who is very reticent about his achievements. According to his family, he is also careful, strong, steadfast, and committed to staying the course.

He raised three sons largely as a single parent. That's a singular achievement in every sense.

But Larry minimizes his own accomplishments.

Here's an example.

When I told Larry that our son was about to receive his Eagle Scout award from the Boy Scouts of America, he became excited about it and asked details. It was apparent he knew a great deal about the Boy Scouts. All he conceded is that he volunteered "a little" with the Boy Scouts.

Months later he sent us photographs of himself and several Wolfensberger cousins that were shot in his Oklahoma City home. In one, a framed "Silver Beaver" award certificate was clearly visible. So I asked questions: was the award his?

All he conceded was that the Silver Beaver award was, indeed, his. It was nothing less, I knew, than the highest honor the Boy Scouts can bestow on a citizen volunteer.

So reserved is Larry that it took me four years to learn the rest of the story.

In truth, Larry had a great interest in the Boy Scouts of America dating back to the youth of his third son, Rick. Larry didn't just become a short-time volunteer. For 30 years, he rose through the ranks of the Oklahoma City organization, from membership on the local Council organization to District Chairperson, and then to election as Commissioner, the highest civilian rank in Oklahoma City's Scouting organization.

For his service, the Boy Scouts presented him the Silver

Beaver award, Scouting's highest honor.

Larry was educated in Oklahoma, earning a degree in architecture. He became a contractor and later an engineer at the Oklahoma City Works, operated then by an AT&T subsidiary that has since become Lucent Technologies. He retired at age 68.

Interest Comes Later

Like many of us, Larry's interest in his family's history and genealogy came relatively late in life. Over a 20 year period, he searched for information about the Wolfensberger family. He served in genealogical organizations.

cantons agreed to form a "Perpetual Union", pledging their lives and fortunes to preserve their independence from foreign influence. Each canton would shrug

off the Hapsburg yoke and declare a measure of independence, forming local governments and adopting a uniform legal code.

"Wir wollen frei sein, wir die Vater waren. In Keiner Not uns beugen and Gefahr," they pledged. "We want to be free as our fathers were, and no might or danger can bend us," they said.

The Importance of Reutli

With the taking of the oath of Reutli, the first of Switzerland's cantons gave birth to a new country, free of foreign influence, in a manner similar to the signing of our Declaration of Independence.

Were any of the Wolfensberger family's descendants at Reutli?

Probably not, since the family originated in Canton Zurich. Certainly no record exists of their participation.

The knight from which this

family descends, Baldebrecht, was almost certainly a willing ambassador of the House of Hapsburg until he died in 1259. Like other representatives of the Austrian kings, Baldebrecht apparently collected taxes, maintained roads and otherwise represented the interests of the Hapsburgs in the region surrounding today's Bauma.

Larry Jones, WFA President, Retires

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Searching for a family association, he found none.

So in 1994, Larry was instrumental in founding the Wolfensberger Family Association. That year, the WFA board elected Larry to head the new organization.

In addition to genealogy and Scouting, Larry is also a committed conservationist. For example, Larry coordinated the planting by Boy Scouts of 1776 Redbud trees to celebrate the nation's bicentennial. For his efforts, the Boy Scouts awarded him the coveted Hornady Award for his innovative and outstanding conservation efforts.

Larry has also been active in a host of nonprofit organizations. They range from the Oklahoma Senior Nutrition Program Development Foundation, which feeds needy seniors, to Oklahoma City Beautiful, a major conservation group.

The WFA is one of the highlights of his long commitment to service. He has collected names of over 50,000 relatives in his computer database. As family members discover the association, Larry adds them to his database, then sends them a pedigree linking them to the family.

Larry's commitment has meant a lot to many family members. As one relative said, "Larry has given me back my family. I thought I was the only Wolfenbarger around."

Now Larry, take time to smell the flowers you so richly deserve.

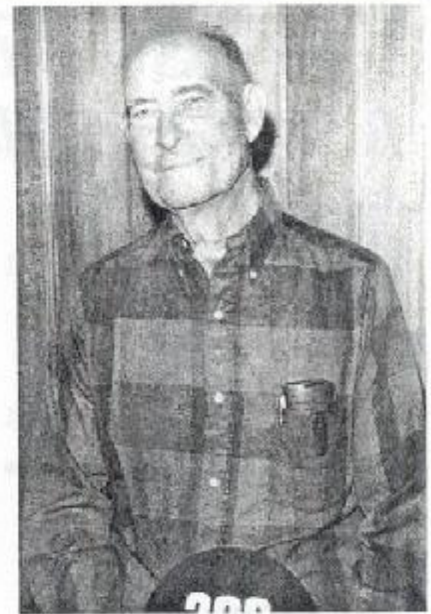
