### **Support Your Ancestor's Cemeteries**

During my recent visit to Mount Airy, NC, I visited the Salem United Methodist Church cemetery where many of the Sparger ancestors are buried. At the entrance to this well kept cemetery was a small sign which is shown on page 7. I felt it would be appropriate to include it in this Newsletter since it would be a way for many Sparger descendants and WFA members to learn about a pressing need. This sign brought to mind my experience several years ago.

I was searching for my great grand-father's (Milton Evans) grave which the family Bible said was in the Kirkland Cemetery in Kirkland, TX. Kirkland, TX was not much more than a railroad siding with a grain elevator. This small cemetery was located just off US Hwy 287 near Childress, TX out on the prairie. The gate had fallen down and the surrounding fence was in bad repair. While the grass was cut, the weeds were making a great effort to reclaim this small plot of prairie. I visited the lady who had the plat of the cemetery and she told me of the problems they were having to maintain this small cemetery. When I returned home, I sent her a small donation.. Soon after, I received a nice letter from the Kirkland Cemetery Association which was formed to raise funds to provide upkeep for the cemetery. I encouraged my family members to donate to this association. Since that time, I have received an annual reminder from the KCA and always send them a donation. Now I find the fence has been replaced, the gate repaired and a lot of landcaping has been repaired and installed.

### **WFA Incorporates**

The Wolfensberger Family Association took another step forward in recent months as our Board of Directors voted to incorporate the organization as a 501 (c)(7) non-profit organization in Texas.

As of May 1, the organization took on the legal name of the Wolfensberger Family Association, Incorporated. Despite the change, the corporation retains the same purpose: "to bring the members of the Wolfensberger family into closer association through family reunions and other social activities revolving around matters of common historical and genealogical interest ...."

In my mind, it is a coming of age to the family association because it provides greater protection of our assets against frivolous lawsuits. But it also makes the family corporation a stronger non-profit organization. In its new guise, the association corporation is much like a common 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, except that its focus is family history and genealogy rather than social services.

I wish to thank WFA board member W. Frank Wolfenbarger of Irving, Texas, who worked under Board of Directors direction with a local attorney, Scott D. Curry of Irving, to draft articles of incorporation and obtain certification from the Texas Secretary of State on May 1, 2003.

Incorporation not only describes the purpose of the WFA as a family genealogical society, but also provides protection against potential lawsuits. More importantly, it gives permanence to the WFA as an international family association.

It's important for U. S. members, who hold the predominate membership in the Association, to realize that the WFA is also an international organization. Approximately 30 members live in Europe, most of them in Switzerland. Two directors – Dr. Rudi Wolfensberger of Solothurn and Peter Wolfensberger of Zumikon – are also active members of the WFA board.

In our most recent Board of Directors meeting, board members voted to reschedule our next quarterly conference call to a Friday night (November 21, 2003) instead of our customary Saturday night. Even with the sixhour time difference, this change should make it easier for our European members to participate.

It's also important to remember that the WFA erected a memorial in September 2001 in Bauma, our historic family home, on the site of the original Wolfensberger family castle built there in medieval times.

We are an international family – one which can be traced to the 14<sup>th</sup> Century in the Zurich area. Our original ancestors, John and Margaretha Wolfensberger, came to this country in 1730 from the Alsace-Lorraine region of France, settling in the area around Lebanon, Pennsylvania.

The change to an incorporated status gives this six year-old association a permanence and protection never before available. With challenges ahead, we welcome volunteers willing to work to build a larger, stronger association with a passionate interest in the family's history and genealogy.

# **WFA Memorial Dedication Videotape**

# The Joseph W. Spargur Limb of the Wolfensberger Tree

Joseph W. Spargur, born 1 March 1781 near Mount Airy, North Carolina, married Rachel, daughter of Bowater and Rebecca (Burris) Sumner. In 1804 Joseph W., his wife Rachel, their small children, accompanied by his brother Reuben & Rachel's Uncle Bowater Sumner set out for the "Western Frontier". They settled in a log cabin on Fall Creek, near the present site of New Petersburg in Highland County, Ohio. They cleared several acres of land and established a mill near their home. Reuben. who never married, made several trips back home. In 1815, while visiting his parents near Mount Airy, he became ill and died. He was buried near his parent's home. Joseph sold this mill to Milton Worley. He then cut a road through the unbroken forest to a location on Rocky Fork Creek, south of the place where Puncheon Run emptied into it. Spargur and David Reese soon had a sawmill, grist mill and a carding mill in operation. Joseph W.Spargur erected a commodious brick home for his family near the mill site.

He dreamed of a village around the mill location. On 11 March 1818, he had surveyed and laid out a. town on 15 acres and nine poles, with four main streets. The name chosen was Mount Airy after his birthplace in North Carolina. For several years the Hillsboro newspaper carried a Mount Airy column, reporting the happenings around Spargur's mills. Phillip W. Spargur, Joseph's brother, joined him in Ohio in 1809. In 1833, Joseph's brother Henry W. decided to go to Ohio and his 79 year old widowed father, John W. Sparger, accompanied his son's family all the way to Ohio on horseback, where he lived until his death 17 November 1840.

Joseph's daughter, Christina, married Joseph Allen Beavers 23 March 1837 in Highland County, Ohio. Joseph & Christina left Highland County in the fall of 1855 and went to Iowa,

two miles west of High Point and seven miles east of Leon, Iowa. It was wooded land bordering the Walden River. He secured the land directly from the U.S. Government, which was kept in the family until I 967. They made the trip with their 11 children in 2 covered wagons.

Thomas Hamer Beaver was 8 years old when he came to Iowa with his parents. When he was 18, he went to illinois to visit an Uncle and Aunt, John and Mary Spargur Wise, where he met Sarah Amanda Painter, daughter of William and Mary Ann (McCoy) Painter. They were married 26 December 1875 in Knoxville, Illinois.

In 1879 or 80 they moved to Page County, Iowa, where they lived until their deaths. Joseph Elvin Beavers was 2 years old when his parents came to lowa. He married Mabel Clare Higgins 8 September 1910. They had 5 daughters, Esther Roberts, Leta Greenfield, Marjorie Howard, Irene Stackhouse and Ardith Earl. I am Ardith (Beavers) Earl and I live with my husband Neil at 8072 67th Street West, Mojave, California 93501-7191.

Editor's Note: Joseph W. Spargur was the son of John and Christina (Frey) Wolfesparger, who changed his name after 1802 to John W. Sparger(ur). He was the grandson of Johann and Margaretha (Ensminger) Wolfersparger, the immigrants who came to America in the 1730's and who was sworn as a British citizen in Philadelphia in April 1744. John W. Sparger's sons, who went to Ohio adopted the surname spelling Spargur and those children who remained in North Carolina used the spelling Sparger. Our special thanks to Ardith Earl of Mojave, CA for this bit of Spargur history.



### WFA Medallions

In the Novembert 2001 issue of the WFA Newsletter, an article titled 'WFA Medallions" described a pewter ( cast metal) medallion that Larry Jones was ordering for those of our members who might like to have them. A picture of the Wolfensberger medallion is shown here. It measures 2 11/16 inches wide by 3 3/4 inches tall and is approx. 3/16 inches thick. This heavy metal piece would be suitable as a table decoration, for marking an ancestor's grave stone, a paper weight, something else to clutter up your desk, or any other decorative use. Several dozen of the medallions were ordered and shipped as promised. There are about a dozen medallions remaining of the original order.

The WFA wishes to offer these remaining pieces to anyone who wants them on a first come, first served basis. If there is sufficient demand, additional medallions can be ordered and made available to the members, as the manufacturer has the patterns and can make them promptly. The original medallions were priced at \$20.00 each plus \$5.00 for shipping.and this will be the price for the remaining pieces. If you want one or more of these medallions, contact WFA Treasurer Al Creasy by phone at (828) 859-0208 or by e-mail at <a href="mailto:trebla1@alltel.net">trebla1@alltel.net</a>. He will reserve your medallions and give you ordering instructions.

To apply the medallion to an ancestors grave stone or other surface, I recommend you use a product like GOOP Auto Contact Adhesive or GOOP Outdoor Contact Adhesive which can be found in auto and hardware stores. Apply a bead of sealant around the perimeter of the back about half inch from the edge. Press firmly to the stone and hold for a few minutes. A small bead of sealant should ooze at the edges. Use a little more sealant if the stone is very porous to be sure to fill all the voids.

<u>EDITOR'S NOTE:</u> Take a photo of your ancestor's grave and send to me so we can show it in a future issue of the WFA Newsletter. To make it more interesting, give us a bit of family history about this ancestor.
