Ten Years of Rich Family History Told in

Wolfensberger Newsletter

In a telephone conference call in December 1994, eight members of the worldwide Wolfensberger family formed a nonprofit family association to promote interest in our 700-year history. In that historic call, the founders voted to create an active voice for the association.

Ten years ago the voice of the Wolfensberger Family Association, our newsletter *Wolfensberger*, was first published as a means of intensifying communications among family members in the U.S. and elsewhere who descended from a 14th Century Swiss knight.

Since then the *Wolfensberger* newsletter has been distributed to the Association's hundreds of active members each quarter. Like the first issue, each issue blends a history of the family, invitations to family reunions, stories of interesting ancestors, and exchanges of genealogical information, with news of our Association.

WOLFINBARGER MARKS 75 YEARS OF SERVICE

Chino business was built from the ground up!



Olin F. and Jessie Wolfinbarger
Starting out in California



After retirement

WHEN Olin Farrell and Jessie (Crabaugh) Wolfinbarger came to California from Arkansas in 1929, he might not have had the look of a man who would start a business that would last 75 years. It was the first year of a 10 year western migration that brought 400,000 Dust Bowl residents to the promised land in California looking to put down roots for a fresh start in life. He probably made at least part of the journey - even though Route 66 had opened three years earlier - over unpaved roads. In those days, there wasn't a lot of pavement west of Albuquerque and east of San Bernardino.

In 1929 Herbert Hoover was in the White House, Babe Ruth was setting home run records and Charles Lindbergh was the toast of a nation. But it really wasn't that different from today's world. Success was out there for a man who didn't mind getting his hands dirty.

Olin is long gone - he died in 1986 and grandson Randy runs the family business - but O.F. Wolfinbarger Inc. has been selling soil, soil mixes and landscaping materials in the Chino Valley for three generations

"We're pretty proud of that," said Randy, who says he takes care of the "office part" while brother Jerry Jr. runs the "out side part." The business has changed a lot since 1929, when O.F. started out by hauling loads of hay to the dairies and working as a part time milker. "He also used to set gopher traps," Randy said. "They paid him a few cents for every gopher he caught." It wasn't long before he saw another need, so he put side racks on his pickup truck so that he could haul manure out of the dairies and sell it as fertilizer. When he removed the fertilizer, it left holes in the ground, so he trucked in dirt and sold it to the dairies to fill the holes. (Cont. page 4)

Life was tough in the 1930s and O.F. was looking to do whatever he could to earn money and support his family. "My grandfather always told me, 'No matter how hard times are, you just keep working,'" Randy said. "He'd say the harder you work, the easier it gets."

"I was driving a truck through the groves when I was 5 years old," Jerry said. "I was more or less brought up in the company, and I learned as I went." He and his brothers learned about the value of maintaining relationships. A man named Oliver Maxwell came into the office recently and told Jerry that his father had been the first man ever to buy a load of fertilizer from O.F. back in 1929. "He told me my dad sent his dad a box of cigars at Christmas," Jerry said. "Every year for the rest of his life. That was just like my dad."

The company's biggest customers are nurseries, and Wolfenbarger's has been dealing with Colorama Wholesale Nursery in Azusa for more than 25 years. Colorama buys several truckloads of dirt a week, and much of it has to be mixed to very specific recipes. "I have known these guys since 1970," said owner Richard Wilson. "I give them the recipes and they mix them perfectly. They have always done a good job for me and they stand by their products."

Wilson knew the family patriarch and praised him highly as well. "Olin was the salt of the earth," he said.. "He started a business and raised a big family. He understood what it takes to work hard, and every succeeding generation in the family is the same. They're like the people who started this country, the pioneers. That's how I saw Olin". While all the sons and grandsons have gone into the company, some of them tried other things for a while. "I took a 15-year break," Jerry Jr. said. "I drove a truck. I guess it was just too much family. My dad and my Uncle Butch did the same thing, but something always drew us back." Stephanie is another member of the third generation of Wolfenbargers. She has been the office manager for 11 years, and she has seen boom times and slow ones. "We weren't that busy during the recession in the early '90s," she said. "But now, with the economy booming, we have grown back to where we were before."

Where they are today is heading toward a fourth generation and a second century. Randy's sons Michael and R.J., and Jerry Jr.'s sons David, Steven and Dustin have all spent summers working for the company, and one day, they'll run it.

Their challenges will be very different from those their greatgrandfather faced. Several million people live in an area that was wide open when that Model T finished its cross-country journey in 1929.

More, than three times as many people live within 100 miles of Wolfinbarger's than lived in the entire state of California in 1929.

The family no longer lives in the home O.F. built. It's only an office now. But the company still strives to operate under the same principles O.F. did in the early years. "He was absolutely one of a kind," Randy said. "He was a very hard worker, always working. An awful lot of people around here liked and respected him, and a lot of them still come in to this day."

All because back when California was young, a kid from Arkansas didn't mind getting a little dirty. O.F. and Jessie had five sons and two daughters, all of whom are still alive. Not all of them went into the business, but enough did that the company remains strong. James, also known as Butch, is the only one of O.F.'s sons still working. Gene, Jack, Jerry and O.F. Jr. are retired. Daughters Judy and Janalee pursued careers outside the company. Olin Jr. and Vera live in Blythe, CA; Gene and Lucinda live in Fontana, CA; Jerry and Mary, James, Jay Dee and Janalee, Jack and Arlene live in Chino, CA; and Frank and Judy live in Knightsen, CA. The family has grown to 33 grandchildren, 56 great-grandchildren and 24 great-great-grandchildren and still growing.

Editor's Note....Much of the above text is from an article appearing in the Inland Valley Bulletin on June 16, 2004 which was sent me by Stephanie Wolfinbarger of Chino CA. That first issue announced the formation of the association and the appointment of directors. It told of the election of Larry Jones of Oklahoma City as the fulltime unpaid executive director of the WFA in late 1994. It also told of the family's early history based upon Jones' English translation of the introduction to the *Deutsche Schweizerisches Geschlechterbuch*, a 1929 German language genealogical history containing the first published account of the family.

The first *Wolfensberger* newsletter also offered U.S. members, most of who had never visited their ancestral home in Switzerland, a sense of their roots in Bauma, a modest Swiss village in northeastern Zurich canton. Later newsletters told of memorials Association members built in places important to the family's travels. Today, the Association has two major memorial sites: Schafferstown, Pennsylvania, where the first European immigrants lived after crossing the Atlantic; and Bauma, Switzerland, where the family originated.

Announcing reunions has always been part of the newsletter' role, and our first edition invited members to come to events in Tennessee, Texas, Kentucky, Missouri, and Virginia.

The Newsletter is also mailed to a number of libraries and Genealogical Societies.

A prominent article by Larry Jones told of Benjamin Wolfenbarger, grandson of the first Wolfensbergers to settle in the U.S., whose 4,000 to 5,000 descendents were believed to be the most numerous in the family.

The newsletter also announced members of the first WFA Board of Directors, 12 volunteer family members who met – and still meet – by telephone conference calls every four months. Members of our 1995 board included Bonnie Aspenson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Larry Jones, Oklahoma City, Myrna Liddell; Langley, Washington; Ivylyn Martin, Mt. Airy, N.C.; Vernon Osborn, Magnolia, Texas; Weldon Parks, Lewisville, Texas, and John W. Sparger, Marion, Virginia. (Cont. on page 6)

Members also included John W. Sparger, Marion, Virginia; James Sparger, Waynesville, Ohio; Shirley Sutphen, Montrose, Colorado; Bob Wolfenbarger, Summit, New Jersey; Wolf Wolfensberger, Syracuse, New York and William W. Wolfersberger, Winchester, Virginia.

Over the years, the Wolfensberger newsletter has reported stories about some of our most important ancestors, including some who were key players in the nation's history. Our ancestors can trace their service to the country back to the French and Indian War and Revolutionary War. At least two were generals in World War II.

Today the newsletter still serves as the voice of the Association. Members are strongly encouraged to share stories and pictures of their family or a prominent ancestor with readers. residents of Wetzikon, Zurich, Switzerland.

Elsbeth Wolfensberger is the daughter of **Rudolf Wolfens-berger** and **Barbara Stauber**, whose lineage descends from **Hans Wolfensberger**, aka "**Bumann**", born about 1560, whose descendants are found in the Deutsch-Schweizerisches Geshlechterbuch, Vol 4 [and Duetsches Geschlechterbuch, vol. 65]. This **Hans Wolfensberger** is one of the "**Unhang/ Relatives**" that the researcher for the Wolfensberger volume of the Geschlechterbuch was unable to find further documented connection back to the original Wolfensberger families of Switzerland. However, the researcher knew they were relatives, along with 8 other family lines including their descendants.

In additon, this family line connects through another Wolfensberger line, as descendants of **Hans Wolfensberger**, 1579 and **Barbara Kindlimann** through their daughter **Anna Wolfensberger** who married **Heinrich Wolfensberger**, born 1620 in Wetzikon, Zurich, Switzerland.

Allen has also done the extensive research to "verify" each family ancestor of his Wolfensberger lines, by researching parish records, one by one. The good news is, he found no error in the Wolfensberger Geschlechterbuch research. This is a sweet confirmation of the dedicated work Paul Wolfensberger, of Switzerland who submitted to C. A. Starke Publishers, who printed Volumes 4, and 65 for the Wolfensberger family of Bauma, Zurich, Switzerland.

Allen's great grandmother came to America for religious reasons. He also has other Swiss ancestry through the Spaenhaur line of Basel, Switzerland.

I wonder what John paid for it when he ordered it in 1871.

Who are this John's father and mother? Are any of his descendants members of the WFA? Let us hear from you if you know about John.

Allen found us on the Internet. Please share our Internet website with the members of your extended family: www.wolfensberger.org We may be able to find more families who have come to America as you do so.

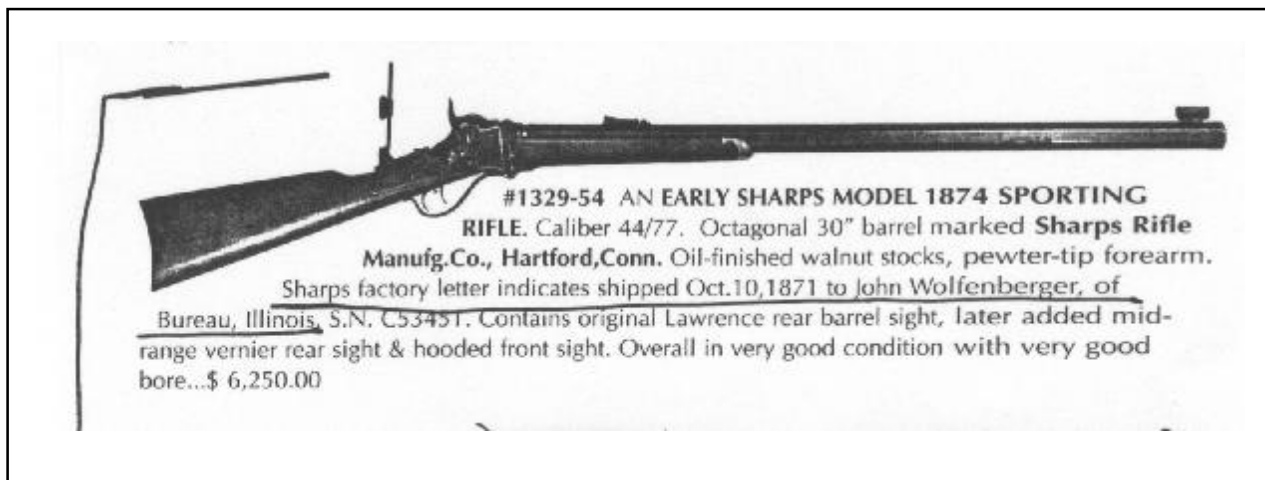
Thank you to Allen, and all the other researchers, who are keeping us "connected to our Cousins" as Larry Jones, our founder and first president would say.

NEWSLETTER NOW AVAILABLE ON LINE!

At the Board meeting June 27th, the delivery of the Wolfensberger Family Association Newsletter by e-mail was discussed and approved. Any WFA member who has a computer that is "ON-LINE" and has the software Adobe Reader may request to receive the Newsletter by e-mail. There are several advantages to receiving your *Wolfensberger* this way. First, it is cheaper. There is no expense to this method of delivery. Next, it is faster. Further, many of the photos in the newsletter are in color which does not come out in the printing as color copies are MUCH MORE expensive than B & W copies.

There are several considerations to receiving the newsletter via e-mail. You must have an e-mail address and a mail box large enough to receive the newsletter file, which usually runs about 200-500 KB in size. The size depends on the number of pictures in the issue. Your computer must have the Adobe Reader software installed as the newsletter will be sent as a .pdf file which can be opened by the Adobe Reader. We recommend you have the latest version of Adobe Reader. To print copies of good quality, you will need a good printer. Dot matrix and other older printers will not produce good quality pictures even though the text will be satisfactory.

To receive the *WOLFENSBERGER* by e-mail, just write WFA Treasurer Al Creasy at 500 Beau Valley Lane, Tryon, NC 28782, by e-mail at trebla1@alltel.net, or phone at 828 859-0208 and request to be changed to e-mail delivery.

If, after making the change, you should you decide that you want to change back to again receive the newsletter via USPS, just let Al Creasy know.

Adobe Reader software is free at the Adobe web site at www.adobe.com. Click on the Adobe Reader label which will take you to the Adobe Reader page. Follow the downloading (cont. page 10)

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instructions to install the READER on your computer. When you receive the e-mail with the newsletter attached, save the newsletter attachment on your hard drive. Note where the newsletter .pdf file is saved. Then click on OPEN. Your computer should find the Adobe Reader software and open the newsletter. You can then print the newsletter on your printer in B & W or in Color as you wish.
