The Thistle of Glasgow.....

by David Wolfersberger It is well known in our family history and lore that the first emigration of Wolfensberger family members occurred in 1730 when Johannes Wolfensberger, his wife Anna Margaretha, and 2 children, Johann Peter and Jacob Friedrich, arrived in Philadelphia on August 29, 1730 on the ship The Thistle of Glasgow. This completed a trip of some 3 months at sea.

One reference I found indicated the total trip could have taken up to 6 months. The trip from the family's home in Alsace down the Rhine to Rotterdam involved passing through some 26 custom houses, each of which would have required payment, making this part of the journey perhaps 4 to 6 weeks.

Then, in Rotterdam, there would have been further delays of several weeks until the ship could be boarded. Finally, after departing Rotterdam, there was one more stop in England. For the voyage of the Thistle in 1730, the records indicate it stopped in Dover, although one mentions Cowes on the Isle of Wight, which I think is an error.

The Thistle's master was Colin Dunlap. There were 260 people on board. There were 2 other references found for a ship named Thistle: One arriving September 19, 1738 with 300 people (via Rotterdam and Plymouth); and one arriving October 28, 1738 with 114 people (via Rotterdam and Cowes). Obviously there is some error in these dates or ship names as it would not be possible for a ship to land in North America twice in a 6 week period. There is also no way of knowing if this is these were same ships as that which carried Johannes and family.

Regardless, it must have been an arduous journey. The ship was apparently tightly packed and sanitation conditions not good. British colony in North America from the Palatine region of Germany were being recruited by William Penn to inhabit his concession of some 40,000 square miles in what is now Pennsylvania. This land was given to Penn by the King of England to settle a debt owed his father. The people leaving were seeking religious and political freedoms. However, the British in charge in this area became concerned about the large number of non-English speakers who were arriving. In 1727, they began to require that all males age 16 and over arriving submit to an "Oath of Allegiance" as well as an "Oath of Abjuration".

The Oath of Allegiance that Johannes signed is very short and if I can read the handwritten text properly, basically says that those signing pledge fidelity to King George II and the governor, and will be subject to the laws of the province. The Oath of Abjuration was much longer. Those taking this oath acknowledged King George II as king and would be faithful to him. The oath also denounced an authority of the Pope or the See of Rome. Records were kept in Pennsylvania of those taking this oath up to its end in 1775.

Arriving ships kept 3 separate lists of passengers: The "captain's list" was a list of all on board. The law at the time required that all on board be listed, but apparently only a few ships listed women and children. The Thistle had only men on their list. The second list was those taking the Oath of Allegiance, while the third was those who took the Oath of Abjuration.

I found a copy of the second and third lists for the Thistle. There is found the name Wolfer A Sperger. Another reference notes this is not a signature but a mark and the name written by a clerk. This name, Wolfer Sperger, also appears on the captain's list. This has been quite an interesting search. My next attempt will be find a drawing of a ship similar to the Thistle. (cont. page 9)

We were bussed from there to Berne where we stayed for 7 days and did our touring from there to the numerous points of interest; churches castles, mueseums, spectacular mountain top scenes of the valleys below.

I wrote to Dr. Rudolf and Peter Wolfensberger before leaving the US but they were both on vacation and business in Spain and the Balkans, but their secretaries replied and said they would like to meet us. So when we arrived in Berne, I called both but they were still away.

On Sunday, Sept. 26th, Rudolf called and wanted to meet us at the hotel to show us around parts of Switzerland. About 3:15 PM, Rudolf drove into the hotel driveway where we were waiting for him. I went out to greet and meet him and what a charming individual he is. He took us to Hotel Beatus in Merligen, a lovely lakeside resort for coffee and then on to a mountain resort. Grindelwald where we could admire the three famous mountains: Jungfrau, Moench and Eiger (with its famous north-wall), then to the bottom of the glacier, the "Oberer Grindelwald gletscher". The glacier is between the mountains "Schreckhorn" and Finsteraarhorn" (4247 m. alt.) What wonderful scenery of Alps peaks and glaciers. As it grew dark, we had a special dinner at this resort. After a wonderful day, Rudolf dropped us back at our hotel. We sure saw a lot of Switerland during the time we were with Rudolf. and certainly enjoyed his dissertation as we travelled about the countryside. Because of the late hour, we were unable to visit Bauma and the Wolfensberger memorial stone there."



John Wolfenberger's Rifle

I read with interest the short article in the August Newsletter about the rifle sold to John Wolfenberger, Bureau, IL. Here are some comments. According to information that I have, Charles and Philip Wolfersberger, sons of John Wolfersberger (II?, born 1789) moved from Campbellstown, PA to Bureau County, IL in 1851 or 1852. Charles had 2 sons: John (III?) born 1850, and my grandfather, George S. Wolfersberger born 1870. John III had 1 son, Newell who was injured when a church bell he was helping to install in the Methodist Church in Malden fell. My father told me this caused him to have a hunched back; he never married.

I wonder if the John Wolfenberger mentioned in the add is indeed the John Wolfersberger who is my great uncle? His location is noted as Bureau, IL. I know of Bureau County were my father was born, and Bureau Junction, a city also in Bureau County. Bureau Junction is located not very far from where my father was born, which was on a farm near Malden, IL. Perhaps the Wolfenberger in the ad is just another example of how our name got changed from time-totime.

I don't recall my father or his sisters mentioning a John Wolfenberger in the area, but I also don't recall much if any discussion about my great uncle John either.

One other little piece of information. I have an old Colt 22 rifle with an octagon barrel that belonged to Newell Wolfersberger, then was given to my father on Newell's death. It hasn't been fired in years; in fact I probably am supposed to have a permit for it which I don't.

Perhaps you can forward this to Charlotte Lucas. I don't have her e-mail or PO address.

Just thought you and Charlotte might be interested in this. This probably also gives me reason to get up to <u>Princeton, Bureau County seat and do a little researcch</u>.

several advantages to receiving your newsletter this way. First, it is cheaper. There is no expense to this method of delivery. Next, it is faster. Further, many of the photos in the newsletter are in color which does not come out in the printing as color copies are MUCH MORE expensive that B & W copies.

There are several considerations to receiving the newsletter via e-mail. You must have an e-mail address and a mail box large enough to receive the newsletter file, which usually runs about 200-500 KB in size. The size depends on the number of pictures in the issue. Your computer must have the Adobe Reader software installed as the newsletter will be sent as a .pdf file which can be opened by the Adobe Reader.

Adobe Reader software is free at the Adobe web site at www.adobe.com. Click on the Adobe Reader label which will take you to the Adobe Reader page. Follow the downloading instructions to install the READER on you computer. When you receive the e-mail with the newsletter attached, save to newsletter on your hard drive. Note where the newsletter .pdf file is saved. Then click on open, your computer should find the Adobe Reader software and open the newsletter. You can then print the newsletter on your printer in B & W or in Color as you wish. RLE


